THE ALABAMA GRAND MASTER PROJECT

The seed for this project was planted in 2012 on a visit to Decatur City Cemetery with MWPGM Gene Anderton to establish a F.A.G. (Find A Grave) Memorial for Honorary PGM James M. Brundidge.

The purpose of the project is to establish memorials to honor our deceased Grand Masters and their families and to promote Freemasonry via this online database.

The final resting place of all our Grand Masters, especially those who perished before the end of the Civil War, may never be known due to the erosion of time, ravages of war, desecration and small family cemeteries being overgrown or plowed under and converted to farm land and shopping centers.

This project could not have moved forward without the approval of the Corporate Board to use Grand Lodge images and the tireless work of MWPGM Ron Andress for editing and restoring them.

We'd like to extend a Special Thanks to Donna R. Causey who gave her blessing to use biographical excerpts from her book The Grand Masters of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Alabama 1811-2011 on F.A.G. Memorials.

A Custom Flower is placed on each memorial with the year(s) the Grand Master served.

To date we have created 8 Memorials and 83 Flowers, 66 pictures and 4l bios have been added to existing Memorials.

The F.A.G. Project has yielded a never-before-known portrait of our first Grand Master Thomas Wadsworth Farrar and a 66-page family timeline/bio of him until his death of cholera in 1832. Efforts are being made to have the portrait available for display at the 2015 Annual Communication.

It always seems that COST is the bottom line question for any GL project. The answer is a 100% totally FREE vehicle of promoting Freemasonry 24/7/365.

It is our vision that this project will always be a work-in-progress and will eventually expand to establish memorials for as many Grand Lodge officers as possible and for all Lodges to begin a Find A Grave project of their own to honor their Past Worshipful Masters and other Lodge Officers.

THE PASSAGE OF TIME

My Father passed away November 3,1990. About a year before his death we had a conversation about time. I was 42 at the time and mentioned how quickly the time was passing. His comment was "you haven't seen anything yet, wait until you turn 50, time shifts into overdrive". Truer words have never been spoken, he has been gone 24 years and 4 months and it seems just like yesterday that we were having that conversation!

So it is with my year as Grand Master; it has already been 4 months since Grand Lodge and it seems that there is not enough time to accomplish all of the goals I set, to have the personal contact with the Committees that I hoped for, or even visit as many Lodges as I had planned. I have reached the conclusion that

once you have finally figured out this job, it is time to step down and hand over the reins to the next man in line.

It is my opinion that I am no different than all those Brothers who served as Grand Master before me. They wanted to see the Fraternity grow and flourish during their tenure and all had the desire to leave it in as good a condition, if not better, than when they assumed office. Like them, I love this Fraternity and it is my earnest desire that it survive so that our Grandsons and their sons can have the opportunity to become Masons.

During the month of January, I had the opportunity to meet with the Brethren of our Five Groups at various locations across the State; to present ideas and proposals that could assist in retaining members, attract new

members and give us the finances to support new programs. Part of the goal of these meetings was to inform the membership of our current status, show projections for our future, to educate and plant the seed that we can no longer do business as usual.

Historically, this fraternity does not adapt to change in a very timely manner. In other words we are slow to adopt new ideas or change the way we do things. Time is not on our side! The average age of an Alabama Mason is 64.5 and 45% percent of our membership is 68 years of age and older. At the current rate of decline, our membership will decrease by approximately II,000 in another ten (IO) years! For those of you who insist that it has "always been done a certain way" and "we have never done it that

MEETING PLACES OF THE GRAND LODGE OF ALABAMA

The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Alabama has met in the capital city throughout its history. The Grand Lodge met in Cahaba from 1821 to 1825, Tuscaloosa from 1826 to 1846 and finally in Montgomery from 1847 to the present. Each time the Grand Lodge followed the Capital.

During it's time in Cahaba, the Grand Lodge met at the hall of Halo Lodge appears to still be in existence today. According to the book, "Selma, Queen City of the Blackbelt" by Alston J. Fitts III, Jesuit priests moved the Masonic hall in Cahaba to Selma in 1880 and today it is known as St. Andrew's Hall (pictured above), which is now part of the Queen of Peace Catholic Church located at 309 Washington Street in Selma. This will be researched further when time allows for more detailed research.

In Tuscaloosa, the Grand Lodge was convened at the hall of Rising Virtue No. 4. At the 1830 communication, the Grand Lodge authorized funds, in an amount not to exceed \$2,000, for the building of a Masonic hall to be occupied jointly by the Grand Lodge, Grand Chapter, Tuscaloosa Chapter, and Rising Virtue No. 4. Just before the Grand Lodge convened in 1836, the Hall was lost by sale "under execution for the cost of its erection." In 1837, the Grand Lodge met at "Cantley's Room." In 1838, the Grand Lodge once again met at the hall of Rising Virtue No. 4. The last few meetings were held at the "Grand Lodge Room" or "Grand Lodge Hall" in Tuscaloosa.

The Grand Lodge did try and secure a hall of its own in December of 1844 when a motion was made to purchase the "Old Court", but it had already been sold. The Grand Lodge continued to meet in Tuscaloosa for three more years, until the Grand Lodge moved to Montgomery.

SECRETS AND TRUST

Much is said in the first degree about keeping Masonic secrets, but little is said about exactly what Masonic secrets are. This can and does cause some confusion. For example:

Some Masons feel that placing a meeting notice in a newspaper violates Masonic secrecy. They feel that anything having to do with Masonry is not for public view and is only proper in the confines of a tiled lodge.

Other Masons believe the fraternity should place itself in the public view. To them, the only secrets we are bound to keep are certain words and modes of recognition.

Much is also said in the First Degree about writing anything that could reveal anything about the degrees, the oaths, or our teaching.

Again, there are some Masons who believe that absolutely nothing should be written or published that in any way might disclose our workings. Other Masons believe that the interpretation that NOTHING can be put in writing is overemphasized and not warranted.

Secrecy without trust is worthless. Another way of saying a man can't keep a secret is to say he can't be trusted.

One of the basics of the marriage vow and the responsibility of a family is trust. Again, saying a man is a good father or a good husband is another way of saying he can be trusted.

There is nothing about Freemasonry intended to create an individual separate from the people he lives around.... Including his family. Many of the lessons we learn in the First Degree find their basis in TRUST.

FROM THE DESK OF THE GRAND SECRETARY

Brethren, I want to take this opportunity to remind you of the Internal Revenue Service's (IRS) requirement that each lodge file Form 990-N or e-Postcard. Any lodge failing to file for three consecutive years will lose its tax exempt status. Filing electronically is easy. You will need your EIN number. If you do not know what it is, you can contact us here at Grand Lodge. We have the number for each lodge in the state. Do not get your own.

To file, go to the IRS web-site. Click on "Filing". Then click on "Charities & Non-Profits". Click on "e-file for Charities and Non-Profits". Find and click on "e-Postcard (Form 990-N)". Find and click on "How to File use this link". You will then click on "Leave IRS Site". You will then be directed to the Urban Institute web-site which handles the e-Postcard filings for the IRS. This web-site was recently hacked, so you will need to change your password before entering this site. If you do not have a password, you can register as a new user. Once there, you will only need to answer a couple of questions and you will be finished.

You have four and a half months from the end of the fiscal year to file this report. Our fiscal year ends September 30th, so you have until February 15th of the next year to file.

There is no penalty for filing late. However, if you lose your tax exempt status, the fee for getting it back is \$400.00 if your net assets are less than \$250,000 which includes your building. If your net assets are more than \$250,000, the fee is \$850.00. We have lodges in the state that have faced this situation, so please keep your e-Postcard current.

The second thing I want to remind

you about is it will soon be time for your lodge's Annual Communication. The Masonic Code states that officers will be elected at the regular communication preceding June 24, and be installed as soon as practicable after the election, but in no case longer than 45 days after the election. Also at this communication, you will vote on two proposed Constitution changes. We will send the proposed changes to you sometime around the end of April. Each lodge must file all annual reports with Grand Lodge no later than August 14. A complete list of the reports may be found in Article 6-Section 21 of the Constitution and report dates in Edict 8.13 of the Alabama Masonic Code. There are five things we will need:

1) Your Master and Secretary (short form). 2) Lodge officers (long form). 3) Your vote on the proposed changes to the Constitution. 4) The Annual Report. 5) Grand Lodge dues. Please remember to send these reports in on time

=FREEMASONS, FREETHINKERS=

Mama often said that you're known by the company you keep, and encouraged us not to associate with people of bad character. Mama was right, but I've found that we are sometimes better defined by our differences from our enemies or detractors. This is particularly true of Freemasonry.

Over the centuries Masonry has attracted its share of enemies and detractors, and it is sometimes hard for us to understand why. Probably the most notable episode linking Masonry and persecution involved the suppression of the Knights Templar. This well-known attack on Masonry, led by Pope Clement V and King Philip IV of France, was but the opening chapter in a long history of Catholic adversity to Freemasonry.

Since then, the Vatican has made several decrees forbidding Catholics from becoming Freemasons under threat of excommunication. A 1983 statement from the Sacred Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith approved by Pope John Paul Il stated "The faithful who enroll in Masonic associations are in a state of grave sin and may not receive Holy Communion." and "... membership in them (Masonic associations) remains forbidden." It was in reaction to this declaration that the 85 year old priest Rosario Francesco Esposito declared himself a Freemason even though he was once commissioned by the Church to study the Church's teaching on masonry.

This brings to mind a situation much nearer to home, and one that some of you may know better than I. In the early 1990's suspicions about Masonry had surfaced in the Southern Baptist Convention. Seeking to gather information about the fraternity prior to taking a vote to denounce Freemasonry, the Home Missions Board of the SBC commissioned Dr. Gary Leazer to conduct a study of the Order. Far from finding a secret nest of non-believers, Dr. Leazer reported favorably concerning the Masons, ioined the fraternity himself, and is now the Senior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of Georgia.

The church has not been Masonry's only foe. Kings in several European countries have at some time banned Freemasonry Evident in these bans in Europe is the correlation between anti-Masonry and absolute monarchies. Where the ruler or

ruling family has or tries to maintain complete political control, Masonry is not welcome. Where constitutional monarchies existed and where the people exerted more power and influence, Masonry flourished. Or, perhaps where Masonry flourished, the people came to exercise a greater degree of self-government.

The story of the birth of our nation is a Masonic Who's-Who, but even here in the US the Anti-Masonic Party came to power following the Morgan Affair, winning a number of gubernatorial and state legislator elections. It nominated William Henry Harrison for president in 1840, but he ran, and won, as the candidate of the Whig Party.

The 20th century saw several instances of persecution of Freemasonry. In Hungary, there were raids by communist army officers on Masonic lodges, along with theft, and sometimes destruction, of Masonic libraries, archives, paraphernalia, and art works. Several Masonic buildings were seized and used for anti-Masonic exhibitions. Masonry was outlawed by decree in 1920.

In Italy in 1924 Benito Mussolini decreed that members of his Fascist Party who were Masons must choose between the organizations, and in 1925, he dissolved Freemasonry in Italy, claiming that it was a dangerous political organization.

During Spain's civil war, under

the dictatorship of Francisco Franco, both the communists and nationalists attacked Freemasonry. Masons were shot, tortured and murdered by organized death squads in every town in Spain. The slightest suspicion of being a Mason was often enough to earn a place in a firing squad, and the blood-letting was so fierce that, reportedly, some Masons were even hurled into working engines of steam trains. By 1937, according to the annual Masonic assembly held in Madrid, all Masons that had not escaped from the areas under nationalist control had been murdered

Germany, he, too, sought to persecute Freemasons. The Nazis claimed that high-degree Masons were willing members of the Jewish conspiracy and that Freemasonry was one of the causes of Germany's defeat in World War I. Special police were assigned to ferret out and imprison Masons. Like the yellow Star of David badge used to identify Jews. Masonic concentration

As Adolph Hitler rose to power in

camp inmates, branded as political prisoners, wore an inverted red triangle as the badge of their crimes. The total number of Freemasons from Nazi occupied countries who were killed is not known, but it is estimated that between 80,000 and 200,000 Freemasons were murdered under the Nazi regime.

From the 1700's Freemasonry has been considered heresy in most of the Islamic world. On July 15, 1978, the Islamic Jurisdictional College, declared Freemasonry to be "dangerous" and "clandestine".

In the Far East in 1938, as Japan sought to expand its empire, a Japanese representative to a world conference said, "Japan is at war not with China but with Freemasonry, represented by General Chiang Kaishek, the successor of his master, the Freemason Sun Yat-sen."

Isn't it amazing that dictators, fascists, and extremists across the political spectrum seem to find a threat in Freemasonry? Yet Freemasonry has survived, and is

indeed making a comeback in Europe, in South America, and in Africa.

Have the dictators, and absolutists misjudged us? Not really. We ARE dangerous: Dangerous because we think; dangerous because we ARE international in scope; dangerous because we believe in individual freedom, and freedom IS the enemy of tyrants, bigots, zealots, dictators, and fundamentalists. We are dangerous because we are not sheep.

I challenge you to be dangerous. Defend freedom relentlessly, but never blindly. Be strong enough in your own convictions that you can weigh different, or even opposing, beliefs. Question the motives of all, particularly mass media, who seek to mold your opinion to theirs, especially if they seem to be telling you what you want to hear. Hardly anyone with a political agenda is ever completely wrong - or completely right. Above all, study, learn, and grow. Never forget your duty - to God, to humanity, to your country, and to your Masonic brethren.
